Freshiah found Education is Power in 2009 when she was continuously sent home from Secondary School because her family could not afford to pay school fee balances.

EIP supported her through her last 2 years of high school. Freshiah was accepted to start at Kenyatta University in September of 2013 but has had to wait two years for Education is Power to raise funds to send her to University.

Finally, after many challenges for her, Freshiah started her degree in Commerce this Monday, January 6, 2014 at Kenyatta University. A spe-

cial thanks to current EIP students, Samuel Wakang'u and Stephen Nyuto who helped show her around the bustling registration process!

She is excited but most of all so thankful to have the opportunity to be going to school. She is the first in her family to pursue a degree and has definitely had some ex-

treme challenges along the way. Freshiah's yearly tuition fees will be \$1775 and she will also require funds for accommodation

During our visit she wanted to let us know that she was very thankful to EIP and it's donors as she had almost lost all hope before EIP stepped in.

Monica to Start Form 1 in February

We met Monica on Monday, January 6th at her home in Magina where she lives with her Grandmother, Grandfather, older brother and cousins.

Monica grew up with her single mother in Kimende until she was 3 when her mother married. The new husband did not allow Monica to stay with them and was abusive when she did stay. Monica was forced to move with her Grandmother and Grandfather with her older brother Francis. Her grandmother has diabetes and is often unable to work because of this. Her grandfather picks up occasional work but too often it is not enough to support the family.

Last year Monica did Form 1 (Grade 9

in Canada) but during term 3 she was sent home because her family did not have the funds for school fees. We have suggested that she should have the opportunity to start again in Form 1 so she could catch up on what she missed.

Monica is a very bright and friendly 15 year old. She says her favourite subjects are Math, Christian Education, English and Kiswahili. Her school fees this year will be \$175.

She was so happy and thankful when she found out Education is Power will try to support her this year.

She started with EIP in Form 2 (Grade 10 in Canada) and this coming week she will be starting her final year of high school. She hopes to go on to study Law so she can be an activist and fight for people rights, particularly single mothers as her mom had struggles providing for her and her sister as a single mother throughout their life.

Ken Kamero: Ken is doing a paid internship in marketing and events with his former College *Zetech*. He recently completed an Advanced Diploma in Tourism Management. Ken helps organize EIP fundraisers in Kenya, and hopes to go to Moi university for a joint degree as soon as possible.
